Help! - What is a tippy tap?

Help! - Can you help us make one?



Yes! First off, we often assume everyone knows what a tippy tap is, but a lot of people have no clue. Fear not, that is why we are here. A tippy tap works by using your foot to tap a lever to tip water out from a container. It means hands can be washed without touching the container – and therefore helps prevent germs from spreading. This little device is great for outdoor ELC, and even more useful as we work to prevent the spread of viruses and germs.



What you need ✓ 4 sticks or canes (about 1.2m long) ✓ 1 shorter cane (about 90cm long) ✓ Wood for the pedal ✓ Stones ✓ Screwdriver or a hot nail to make holes ✓ String or twine ✓ 3L milk container

Follow five steps to tippy tap success

Extra tippy tap tips

- ✓ Natural branches are usually stronger than cane.
- ✓ The stones are to prevent puddles
- ✓ The deeper you dig your sticks into the ground the stronger they will be (minimum 20cm)
- ✓ The branches will go in much easier if you sharpen the ends with a knife
- Fill as required with warm water (See Care Inspectorate guidance links below)
- ✓ Don't overfill the plastic container
- ✓ Use a thermos to top up and wrap to insulate/keep water warm
- ✓ Did you know, the first 'official' tippy tap was built in the 1980s by Dr. Jim Watt in Zimbabwe?
