2. Showing children's that their own wellbeing is tied in with the wellbeing of the community and the natural spaces they live in








3. Don't just think safety when completing a risk benefit analysis. Have the staff team consider if activities will cause harm environmentally








4. Give young people the opportunity to be trusted and take responsibility








 5. Put nature in your play calendar.
